Developing your thesis

- T. The Crucible OR The Crucible (NOT "The Crucible")
- A. Arthur Miller (**NOT** "Author" Miller)
- G. Drama/Play (**NOT** "story" or "book" etc.)

Developing your thesis

A good thesis must also be:

- 1) succinct
- 2) original,
- 3) controversial/provocative (as in "thought-provoking") and discuss a greater *idea*, *motif*, or *theme*.

It needs to answer the questions:

"So what?",

"Why does this matter?",

"What is the significance?"

"What universal meaning does it contain?"

What is the hidden, deeper, figurative meaning behind it?

What could the author be trying to say?

Which is better?

Topic(s): morality & hysteria

Quote: Abigail exclaims, "Uncle, the rumor of witchcraft is all about. . ." (Miller 170).

Analysis 1: The rumor of witchcraft breeds hysteria in the town.

Analysis 2: The people's lack understanding of science and disease leads them to ignorantly rely on a religious explanation of the girl's outbreak; thus, the people begin to buy into this idea of witchcraft.

Examples:

Topic: The importance of a good name

Thesis: One central motif of *The Crucible* is the importance of a good name. The meaning of a good name to John Proctor at the end of the play, however, is vastly different from the good name that Reverend Parris seeks, revealing both the importance and sacrifice of one's reputation.

Topic: The true model of authority

Thesis: While authority stems from many different sources in *The Crucible*, and different characters responded to it in various ways, the play ultimately supports the response of Rebecca Nurse as the true model.
