Writing a literary analysis. . .

Literary Analysis:

Reading (closely)	Interpretation
Literal Comprehension: what the text says	Interpretation: What the text means
Writing: Summary	Writing: Commentary

Developing your thesis

- **1. TAG*** (title, author, genre(s)) *Note: You may choose to place some of the info. earlier on in your introduction later on
- 2. motifs
- **3. significance:** What theme(s) do these motifs point to? How are these motifs/themes characteristic of Gothic Romanticism?

Developing your thesis:

It lets the reader know the main idea of the paper and answers the question, "What am I trying to prove?" This is a complete sentence that identifies the texts, author, motifs you're writing about, and the universal idea / significance revealed through these motifs.

T.A.G. (Title, author, genre(s))

Titles: All works are in "quotations", because they are "short" works.

Author: Edgar Allan Poe *Use his full name the first time you mention him.

Genre: Poems or short stories (works)

Possible Gothic Romantic themes:

- escapism/the need to escape reality
- descent into madness
- darkness/evil of the human heart
- terrorizing/paralyzing effects of fear/terror
- human grief/loss
- the cost/ugly side to love (heartbreak)
- good versus evil (heart)
- duality of man/split personality (brain: id, ego, superego) or 2 sides of heart/soul
- instinct (impulse) versus morality (moral compass)
- inevitability of death/mortality
- uncertainty/unpredictability of nature and human nature
- power of the supernatural/fate

Writing tips

- third person only
- present tense
- Note: Don't mistake the narrator for Poehimself.
- action verbs
